This event has just been offered formal international recognition as a **UNESCO 40th Man and Biosphere Anniversary Activity** during 2011.

UNESCO., the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organisation's Man and the Biosphere Program (MAB), designated the former Noosa Shire boundary as a world-class biosphere reserve in September 2007. It was a proud first for Queensland.

In the intervening period, the Noosa Biosphere Reserve has come to be recognised as a new model for global biospheres through excellence in a Plan of Management, a community engagement model covering economic, social, education R&D, environmental, cultural and tourism interests.
